


When approaching the Old Town, you won't miss the towering column topped by a statue of a man with a sword and a cross. It's Kolumna Zygmunta and is a token of gratitude to King Zygmunt III Waza who in 1596 moved his seat from Cracow to Warsaw, making it the new capital of Poland. Behind it you will see a red castle - **Zamek** Królewski - that looks inconspicuous, but when you go around it, you will see a more picturesque side, together with its beautiful gardens (with free entry all year!). The Old Town itself was demolished during WW2, and successfully rebuilt, which means that almost all you'll see here is less than 80 years old. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and definitely a good spot for Instagram pictures and some historical walks. After the Old Town, you can head north to a more serene

but still pretty, New Town area and say 'hi' to the statue of Maria Skłodowska-Curie. While walking, look to your right to capture the best the building. ul. Mordechaja Anielewicza 6 views on Vistula river.





It's one of those cool all-day-breakfast places, but with a modern twist: you choose 3 or 5 small plates and mix the spreads, veggies and sweet stuff. Together with good food, at **Mon Nom** you get the cutest fluffy companionship of a corgi, who is always curious about what you're eating and sits up on his fluffy booty to see your food better. ul.Długa 6

HISTORY OF JEWS IN POLAND

In the middle of the old Jewish district stands Muzeum Historii Żydów Polskich **POLIN**. It is an important educational center, where you can learn not only about the Holocaust, but also about the 1000-year-old history of Jews in Poland. Do not miss the monument to the Ghetto Heroes in front of

9 TASTE OF MOSCOW

The first **escalator** in Warsaw, opened in 1949, is no longer a wonder of technology but it's worth seeing - as a downscaled version of the lavish interiors of the Moscow metro. It was actually a gift from the Russian capital to Warsaw during communist times. Check out a piece of this original machinery in the basement, by the (free and clean!) public toilet and the Stalinist decor on the lower platform. near Stare Miasto tram stops

HISTORY SPEAKS....

.. at **Dom Spotkań z Historią**. This venue hosts loads of great photography exhibitions and discussions that bring us back in time to the Warsaw of yesterday. The in-house bookshop is one of the best places if you're looking for publications on the history or architecture of Warsaw. ul. Karowa 20

THE VISTULA DISTRICT We cherish the Vistula river more and more. And you'll see it at the all-day lively **boulevard**, where we ride bikes, meet with friends, have our first dates and show our music talents. To act like a local, take a walk along the river, and at least once during your Warsaw stay, cross the river with **Kładka** a footbridge that is always busy, but gives the best view at the Old Town and city center.

LIBRARY'S ANOTHER LEVEL
A library doesn't have to be only for studying. Biblioteka Uniwersytecka - a stunning university library - offers a breathtaking city panorama from the roof's beautiful garden. Some say it's really one of a kind in Europe! The best place to meet the deadline or go on a date. All that available between spring and autumn and entirely for free. ul. Dobra 56/66

LIKE AT GRANDMA'S

OMA is the smallest restaurant we know with the most heart-warming cuisine. It's like a visit at grandma's: you get a soup + prominently located in one of the wings of the one dish (with meat or vegetarian) - everyday iconic Palace of Culture and Science (20). they serve something different. The place is rather small, so give them a call to book a table - but believe us: the food is worth this effort! ul. Radna 13

EXERCISE YOUR BRAIN CELLS

It is worth to check Centrum Nauki Kopernik - a science center (not only for kids!) where you can learn about human possibilities, new technologies or learn about the animal kingdom. To visit the Planetarium it is best to reserve a spot (check for the event "The Night of Shooting Stars" in August to watch perseids). Careful for crowds during the weekends. ul. Wyb. When visiting Warsaw, you will want to eat *pierogi* at least once. You can choose some bar mleczny or you can visit **Syrena Irena** which is an alternative to a milk bar with a modern twist. It's a little more expensive, but they serve the best pierogi with duck and plums you can have. Find here other traditional Polish dishes and enjoy our cuisine at its best! ul. Krak. ARTISTIC ENCOURAGEMENT

Housed in a pompous fin-de-siecle building since 1901, Zacheta is Warsaw's oldest contemporary art gallery. Hosts exhibitions of leading Polish and foreign 20th and 21st century artists, an art book shop with a trimmed down souvenir section. Its name is drawn from the historic Society for the Encouragement of Arts. pl. Małachowskiego 3

BEST LOCAL BAZAAR

The 123-year old Hala Mirowska is a beautiful example of fin-de-siecle civic architecture that has survived both world wars. Inside, there is a cross-section of modern Warsaw – from thrift shops frequented by senior citizens on the mezzanine, to a gay disco in the basement. Outside, you will find a famous market (where Margaret Thatcher stopped by to buy tomatoes and mingle with the locals back in 1988) with well-stocked flower stalls. Plac Mirowski 1

18 POSTCARD OF WARSAW

Warsaw is a city of contrast with a complicated history and you can especially see this in Grzybowski Square. This area pre-war was mainly inhabited by Jews, part of this history can still be seen in the synagogue Synagoga Nożyków that survived the Ghetto and Warsaw Uprisings It stands in the shadow of sky-scaper Cosmopolitan. Continue walking in the Próżna street (which means vain) among pre-war tenement houses. Plac Grzybowski / ul. Próżna

19 REMINDERS OF THE PAST While walking around the city center, you may notice gold iron lines embedded in the sidewalks, tracing the borders of the former Warsaw Ghetto. These subtle markers guide you to fragments of the Ghetto Wall, which still stand as silent witnesses to the city's wartime history. Hidden in courtyards at places like Sienna 55, Złota 62, and Waliców 11, these remnants tell tragic stories. Look out for plaques to explore further. It's a quiet yet reflective stop, connecting you to Warsaw's resilient

20 FROM SOVIETS WITH LOVE

Is it a rocket? No! It is the **Pałac** Kultury i Nauki (Palace of Culture and Science) built in 1955 as a 'gift from Soviet nation to Poles', and is a cousin to Moscow famous "Seven Daughters of Stalin". From a place a little bit ignored by locals, nowadays it is a meeting place where you can go for a drink (Bar Studio - 21), to the cinema, see the spider exhibition, visit several museums (e.g. instagramable Muzeum Neonów (Neon Museum)), 4 theatres and an observation deck on the 30th floor. You can basically spend all day there. Plac Defilad 1

DANCE THE NIGHT AWAY

Ever dreamed of dancing the night away in a palace? Welcome to Bar Studio. Serving as the foyer of the theater above, this lively spot blends a vibrant atmosphere with an unbeatable central location.

ART IN THE BOX

At plac Centralny, right in front of the Pałac Kultury i Nauki, you will see a huge white box that each Warszawiak has a strong opinion about. Some love the building's freshness, some hate it - but the art inside Muzeum Sztuki Nowoczesnej is what can unite us. Don't mind the low rates on Google - they were made before any exhibition was there. Pop in and enjoy the worldclass modern art exhibitions. ul. Marszałkowska 103

TAKE THE ESSENCE OF POLAND WITH YOU In the Panda Concept Store you will

find beautiful souvenirs created by local artists. Socks with polish sites, jewelry, posters, mugs with pierogi, postcards, mugs with the pope... just name it, buy it and enjoy it! ul. Chmielna 27/31

DRAG YOUR FRIENDS TO THIS CLUB

La Pose Varsovie is a home for many polish Drag Queens so you can find drag related activities here such as bingo or queer-oriented parties with drag, burlesque and vogue performances. So go grab a drink and dance the night away. ul. Mazowiecka 6/8

NO FORKS, JUST YOUR HANDS

While walking around Warsaw, you will for sure get invited by waiters to random restaurants to have random pierogi. But why to have random *pierogi* if you can have a huge caucasian *pieróg*? Pop into a small bar Ministry of chebureks to eat great chebureki - a huge stuffed pieróg-like dish originating from Turkish and Mongolian cuisine. 26° COFFEE FOR A BOOKWORM

If you're a bookworm and in need of a coffee - the coziest place for you in the city center will be Wrzenie Świata. It is filled with good books, a bookstore and coffee shop at once. 📆 ART COMMUNITY'S DEN 🕥

Looking for an intimate concert by a local avant-garde band? Klubojadalnia Młodsza Siostra promises a true community experience, also offering delicious, primarily vegetarian cuisine in a natural, laid-back, and welcoming atmosphere. For events check their FB page. ul. Dobra 14/16

It's open usually May-September, making a perfect place for a meeting with friends. Schodki (the stairs) is what we call a part of the boulevard by the Vistula river. But they are not just stairs - it's a place to experience Warsaw's real nightlife during summer. Just grab some drink and sip it while sitting on THE stairs. Schodki are kind of a symbol of youth and freedom. It's a rare spot where you can legally drink beer open-air in Warsaw. BONUS QUEST: visit *schodki* and ask Polish people if they know any song about it.

h RAVE UNDER THE BRIDGE

Nestled under a bridge, K-Bar Powiśle stands out as a unique staple of Warsaw's nightlife. With a Berlin-like vibe, the venue creates an electric atmosphere enhanced by street art and a diverse crowd. Its music program spans jungle and dub to bass-heavy

Muzeum Narodowe w Warszawie (National Museum) is the place to experience a crash course in Polish art and history. From medieval altarpieces and Gothic sculpture, to great paintings of Jan Matejko and modern Polish design. The building is an attraction in itself – designed in the 1920s, is a true pearl of modernism. al. Jerozolimskie 3

h THE PARTY IS NEVER OVER

Right by the Palm, you cannot miss a huge modernistic building that until 1990, for almost 40 years, used to be home for the communist party. Warsaw citizens used to call it **Dom Partii** (House of the Party). Now 'the party' has a new meaning: each summer the patio vibes with music and people hanging out, sipping a drink from CUDA or neading to Rakieta for an improv gig. You can also pop into **Zagrywki** - a popular activity bar where the cool kids go to for karaoke or mini-golf. *ul. Nowy Świat 6/12*

33° POLISH PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF BAR

Instead of asking locals how it was during communist times - check it yourself. Although Bar Kawowy "Piotruś" opened in 1958, it seems like not much has changed since then - but that is a good thing! It is a small, dark, cozy place with traditional food and a variety of Polish drinks. Start your evening in Warsaw with one of the specialty shots and try to become a local even just for a second. ul. Nowy Świat 18/20

Pub-crawling for Lazy ones

This cluster of tiny, atmospheric bars is a true maze of flavours, music, and endless conversation. Whether you're in the mood for craft cocktails, a cold beer, or just good vibes, **Pawilony** offers it all. You'll find a variety of spots, including a Vietnamese bar, a shisha lounge, and even a small disco, making it a great place to explore Warsaw's vibrant nightlife. ul. Nowy Świat 22/28

35 ICONIC LUNCH SPOT

Iconic cafe which is a go-to place for artists and regular human beings for already 25 years now. **Między Nami** is always perfect for either a lunch break, a budget-friendly first date or an evening friends' meeting for gossip and wine. ul. Bracka 20

BIG-TIME SMALLEST CINEMA

Kino Amondo, tucked in the heart of Warsaw, is an alternative haven for cinephiles, also is a good idea for anybody who wants to hide from the city centre. 

THEY ARE FINNISH?!

If you were to be teleported there, based on wooden houses around you, you would assume to be in the middle of some small Polish village 50 years ago. Or.. a Finnish one? The houses were part of Finnish post-war reparations (towards the USSR!) and landed in Warsaw, making it the first post-war housing estate in the demolished capital. Osiedle Jazdów, a frozen-in-time

One of the best ones in Warsaw are made by legendary Pracownia Zagoździński. You can often spot a long queue for their pastries. i PRACTICATO + NFO+++

During the last decade Warsaw definitely became more friendly for cyclists and pedestri ans, and our public transportation is well-organized and cheap, so give up on a car or taxi and go with what the public transport offers!

Your best friend in Warsaw's public transport exploration will be Jak Dojade mobile app, which is free and will show you the best connections. You can also buy tickets there, but remember to validate them after entering the means of transport by scanning a special QR code in the bus or tram. To enter the metro, you'll scan the code outside the metro gates.

During spring, summer and early autumn, you can rent a public **Veturilo** bike and use one of many bike lanes around the city - it's not the Netherlands, but Warsaw tries its best to make it easy for cyclists. There are 337 of Veturilo stations around the city, with total of 3340 bikes, and the first 20 minutes of the ride is free! All you need is the Veturilo

Underground transport stands really well in Warsaw. We have only 2 metro lines -M1 (blue) and M2 (red) - but you can go across the city in just a couple of minutes. t usually goes from 5am till midnight and on weekends even until 2am. On the escalator, always remember to stand on the right side and let the people run on the left - we really stick to that rule in Warsaw!

60 MILDLY WILD

Park Praski, on the other side of the river, used to be THE party centre in the previous two centuries. It all started as a fundraising event for the nearby hospital. Races, stunts, fireworks, hot-air balloons. There even was a competition to climb a soap-covered pole to grab a small gift. After old Warsaw. Szynk Praski: ul. If you're looking for a bite, you've got options: Szynk Praski for hearty Polish classics, Peaches Gastro Girls for delightful vegan dishes, and Folle Pizza e Pasta for exactly what its name promises. ADVENTURE SHOPPING

Praga's antique shops are like stepping into a time capsule. Dive into pre-war Warsaw's curiosities and hunt for that one-of-a-kind gift that screams personality. From intricately painted porcelain teapots to vintage vinyls and old-school cassettes. **LookInside** lets you play Tetris on a retro TV and **Zakładka** specializes in books, pre-war postcards and maps that tell stories of a bydone Warsaw. Warsaw is good at night buses. If you miss the last metro

when coming back from a party, there's a high chance for a night bus. Their numbers start with N and they stop on request, so make sure you'll wave when you see it approaching the bus stop or press the STOP button on the bus when you want to get off.

TRAM WITH T

During summer, you may spot some old school tram with letter T instead of a number. T' stands for 'tourists' because it usually passes the most important tourist spots in Warsaw. Check out their schedule on WTM website (Warsaw's public transportation company website) and remember to have your regular ticket on you!

Public Ferries

Between May and September, you don't need to cross the Vistula river with a bridge. Do so on a free public ferry! There are 3 ferries (Wilga, Słonka and Pliszka), going approx. every half an hour (and if the water's level allows) from 3 locations in the city:

Wilga's route: Old Town (by the Fountain Park) - beach by the ZOO Pliszka's route: Most Poniatowskiego - beach by the Stadium Słonka's route: Cypel Czerniakowski - beach at Saska Kepa

Of course you can drink tap water in Warsaw! It's clean, it's tasty and we really cherish it. The quality of Warsaw's tap water is checked by 8 hard-working mussels - and they're never wrong! If at any municipal event you see a blue-ish water-wagon with the name Warszawska Kranówka, don't hesitate and fill your
